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Then came the war.
John Black entered the
Air Force and musical
studies were forgotten.
Six years away from
the pursuits of ordinary
life changed his young
ambition for the life of
a conductor of opera
and his interest centred
around the farm.

At Oxford, he gained first class honors in agriculture and for his doctorate of philosophy submitted a thesis on the growth of plant life.

became president of the
Oxford University Music
Society and always
played for the University Opera Group as
principal flaulist.
During these six years,
he built up a wide musi-

cal knowledge. He played in over 100 amateur and professional to on c erts — chamber music, solo, and orchestral—but always with the strong desire to direct an orchestra himself, purely as an
