The membership of the orchestra has grown over the years enabling it to cover a broad repertoire including classical, contemporary, operation and choral works. The orchestra has accompanied such eminent artists as Beryl Kimber, Robert Dawe and Ronald Woodcock. Since October 1982, the conductor of the orchestra has been James Ferguson, formerly a violinist with the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra and now its Assistant Manager. OVERTURE

THE BARBER OF SEVILLE

ROSSINI (1792 - 1868)
The Barber of Seville, Figaro by name, is an opera based on a comedy by Beaumarchais. It was first produced in Rome in 1816. The latter part of the story had already featured in Mozart's equally humorous 'Marriage of Figaro'. However, Rossini is better known for his overtures than for the operas which follow them. What matters if this overture had already prefaced two other operas? Everyone can enjoy it as a work in its own right with its metodies and rhythms and exciting climax.

Of Mozart's last three great symphonies, composed within fifty-two days in the summer of 1788, the second
(No. 40) is probably the best known. Mozart wrote very few of his symphonies and piano concertos in the
minor key, and they have a dramatic poignancy absent from many other works. Clarinets were not in the
original sore, but were added later by the composer. The symphony reveals the composer at the peak of his
genius. One cannot help feeling that the jazzed up version of the opening of the first movement which we
often hear, though frowned on by the purists, might well have appealed to Mozart's impish sense of humour.
At least it testifies to the work's greatness.

OVERTURE

PUNCHINELLO CURZON (1899 - 1973) Frederick Curzon studied violin, cello, plano and organ at an early age. He composed many light orchestral works and conducted much of his own music for slient films, radio and television. He became head of the light music department of Boosey and Hawkes, and was a president of the Light Music Society.

NO DANCES (FROM PRINCE IGOR)

Borodin is chiefly remembered for his orchestral works, but he did write one opera, "Prince Igor", which still remained unfinished at his death. The story, based on an old folk legend, tells of the capture of Prince Igor and his son Vladimir by the Polovetsian Khan Konchak, and the dances form part of the entertainment given by the Khan's followers in honour of his royal prisoners. Eastenizing and barbaric, the dances suggest the trevels of the Tartan tribe in whose camp they take place. More recently they have formed the basis of the popular musical "Kismet" and are frequently heard as background music for modern figure-skating. POLOVETSIAN DANCES (FROM PRINCE IGOR)
