CONDUCTOR Tully Brookes

Tully Brookes is an Adelaide-based pianist and conductor. He is currently completing a PhD at the University of Adelaide.

In 2013 he was awarded the Geoffrey Parsons Award, Australia's most prestigious award for the collaborative pianist.

Tully is music director of the Flinders Street Baptist Church and the Mitcham Orchestra, and has been guest conductor for the Burnside & Norwood Symphony Orchestras.

Aside from music, Tully is an enthusiastic architectural historian. He has co-authored a book on early Tasmanian buildings, and has planned and undertaken fieldwork spanning hundreds of historic rural properties throughout Tasmania and Victoria.

He is a councillor of Recitals Australia and the National Trust of Australia (SA).

About the Australian Veterinary Orchestra

The Australian Veterinary Orchestra was the initiative of Dr Mike Woodham of Sugarland Animal Hospital in Bundaberg, Queensland.

In 2013 Dr Woodham put out a call for members and received expressions of interest from over 40 musical veterinarians.

Force of Destiny Overture

Giuseppe Verdi (1813—1901)

Verdi was an Italian composer best known for his operas.

The Force of Destiny (*La forza del destino*) was first performed in the Bolshoi Kamenny Theatre of St Petersburg, Russia in 1862.

The story, set in mid-18th-century Spain and Italy, tells of Don Alvaro, a young nobleman from South America. He falls in love with Leonora, whose father, the Marquis of Calatrava, is vehemently against their union. An inexorable series of misfortunes follows leading to a final grievous tragedy.

The overture features themes from the opera that foreshadow the destiny awaiting the lovers. Listen for the recurring motive representing fate - three unison notes from the brass followed by a repeated frenzied figure in the strings.

Symphony No 8 in G major, Opus 88

Antonin Dvořák (1841—1904)

I Allegro con brio — II Adagio — III Allegretto grazioso -Molto vivace — IV Allegro ma non troppo

Dvořák composed Symphony No 8 in 1889 and was the conductor at its premiere in Prague in February 1890.

The first movement is characterised by liberal use of timpani. It opens with a lyrical theme in the cellos, horns, clarinets and first bassoon. A bird call flute melody follows leading to the major key.

The second movement is inspired by tranquil landscapes and depicts a summer's day, interrupted by a thunderstorm.

The third movement has the character of a Bohemian folk dance.

The fourth movement, in the form of a theme and variations, is the most turbulent, opening with a fanfare of trumpets.
